As we approach another winter season, we do so a little nervously, remembering how last year, politicians gave us headlines telling us that Christmas was saved, we could celebrate together, only to have to change tack completely at the last minute, leaving many disappointed and distanced from their loved ones.

Things seem a little more hopeful this year, with the success of the vaccine roll out, but there are still little rumblings of caution that we must remain aware of.

Christmas clearly means many different things to different people, but perhaps the desire to gather with those we love is common to many. And this human need for physical contact with others has become heightened in these recent months of enforced separation and seclusion for many.

Since ancient times, human beings, especially those engulfed in the darkness of northern climes, have valued the opportunity to gather, safe from the dark and cold, to share the joys of warmth and community.

I certainly don't begrudge him his Christmas, the more opportunities that are taken for celebration and joy at this time of year - and especially this year the better. And the more we recognise our need of others, and to be there for others, the better...

Church Rededication



It was certainly a long time coming, but we formally rededicated our building for worship on Sunday 26th September. Though we were still being careful about the numbers congregating in the building, it was good to welcome friends from other local churches and faith groups, our local councillor, and folk from our sister churches in Dunfermline and Newburgh.



Also on the 'guest list' were our architect Rosalind Taylor and Lynn

Watt from John Smart and Son, the main contractors.

One of our senior members,



Janette Hutson was joined by one of our youngest, Lucy Wood, to unveil a commemoration plaque, after which



Revd Alan McGougan from Dunfermline offered prayer.

Other members of the congregation took part,

including Beth who introduced our worship. We were particularly delighted to welcome Revd John Sanderson as our guest preacher, John



was brought up in the then West

End church, and is now minister to the URC congregation in Rutherglen. John

encouraged us to make good use of the building and not to try to keep it looking too pristine!

A new focal point in the church is a lectern, designed to reflect the history and character of the church, made

from timber reclaimed from some of our pews. This was dedicated for use by Graeme and Jessie Tarbet from Dundee Congregational Church, in memory of



Graeme's step mum, Winnie, whose bequest had made much of the renovation work possible.

The new facilities were put to good use afterwards as we were able to serve a socially distanced lunch throughout the church and the main hall.



Remembrance Sunday



In the course of the renovation, the war memorials from Pathhead and West End Churches needed to be relocated. The original doorways into the church were to be blocked off and this created two alcoves to accommodate the memorials.

From the Pathhead records available to us, the memorial was first dedicated on Armistice Day 1921, and we assume



that the West End memorial would have been unveiled at a similar time, meaning that this year marks their centenary.

Also discovered during the renovation was that originally the West End

memorial sat in the vestibule, facing the front door, so it has now been returned close to its original location.



Our remembrance service focussed on themes of peace and reconciliation, with a moment for remembrance timed for 11am. This formal act of remembrance was led by Don Clark, who is currently on home leave from the RFA. We were also grateful to Lucy Ordway for lighting our candles of remembrance, before the poppy sprays were taken to each of the memorials.

marriage to Aileen. We wish both couples all the very best for their future happiness.


We also say well done to Rachel Crouthers, who became a prefect at Kirkcaldy High school this year – quite an achievement! Be

Advent and Christmas Arrangements



The theme over the Advent and Christmas seasons this year is *Peace on Earth*. Information cards have been printed, please take one for yourself and another for a friend or neighbour by way of invitation. Information is also on the website and the Facebook page.

Our first Sunday in Advent in on 28th November, when the service will be followed by Tea & Coffee. Then on Saturday 4th December we meet to dress the church up for Christmas. Each year we have a lovely tree donated by the Brady family, and this year we will have fun working out where it will sit! We have an **advent communion** service on the 5th,

and also on the 5th a special reflective service, a Service of Memories at 2.30pm (information is over the page). On Saturday the 11th we have our Christmas Coffee Morning, 10am-12pm. This will be the first time hosting such an event in our new setting, so we'd encourage folks to come along and support, and also to encourage others along by selling tickets at £3. The money raised will support the local Foodbank. Please make a special effort to support if you can. On Sunday the 12th we have our Gift Service, when we are encouraged to bring along toys, and gifts for adults, which will be offered to Fife Gingerbread, who will pass the gifts on to local families. (Please note that gifts should be new, and unwrapped). On Sunday 19th we welcome the Rainbows and Brownies for the **Christmas Carol Service**, the girls' contribution is always enjoyed by everyone! The Carol Service will be followed by lunch in the hall. In the evening of Christmas Eve we have Carols by Candlelight, commencing at 7.00pm. Those who came along in previous years enjoyed the lovely atmosphere, which can only be further enhanced in our new setting. Then on the big day, Christmas Day we have a short celebration at 10.30am, which will once again be a **DIY service**, where everyone who wishes, can participate in some way! There will be offerings on Christmas Eve and Christmas Day to support the work of Fife Women's' Aid. This year for the Sunday between Christmas and New Year (26th) we will join with the town centre Church of Scotland Congregations for their joint service in Abbotshall Church at I lam.
